Food for Thought by Molly Garland, Grassland Specialist

It has been a cold and wet winter, but the warm and sunny months of springtime are right around the corner. It is a suitable time to start thinking about brush management and soil testing in preparation for the upcoming growing season.

Soil testing is a useful tool for determining the kinds and rates of nutrients and/ or animal waste required to maximize and sustain profitable forage production, greener lawns and more productive gardens. Proper soil sampling is crucial to ensure that the soil test results accurately characterize the soil chemical properties that influence nutrient availability to plants.

The best time of year to test your soil depends on the forage species, growth habit and time of nutrient applications. For cool season forages, soil samples should be taken in late spring or early summer. For warm season forages and legume mixtures, soil samples should be taken in late fall or winter. These samples correspond to the forage's dormant period and allow for timely collection of samples and laboratory analysis, as well as planning of nutrient management strategies that maximize forage production.

Baxter County residents can submit soil samples for free analysis through the Baxter County Extension office located at 3 E 9th St, Mountain Home, AR 72653.


Properly applied weed control is one of the most cost-effective management practices available for forage producers. Many weed control practices are relatively inexpensive when compared to other pasture improvement practices. Consider the cost of the initial treatment and the cost of maintenance treatments to avoid losing what was gained by the initial application. I would advise researching the projected forage response, the financial outlay involved and contacting your local extension office for herbicide treatment recommendations.

As a reminder, we have 2 - No-Till Drills, 2 - 300-gallon boom-less sprayers, 2 - drip torches, and a tow-behind field roller for rent.

The Hicks Creek/ White River 319 Water Quality Program is currently running. The primary objective is to maintain or restore water quality in the Watershed. If you own livestock, we can help you reduce silt runoff on your property through conservation planning and cost-sharing. We may be able to assist you with crossfencing, livestock watering lines and watering facilities, heavy use areas for feed and watering stations and spraying for unwanted pasture weeds and planting. Please stop by our office at 406 West Wade Avenue, Suite 2, Mountain Home or give me a call at 870-425-3527, Extension 3, to see if your property falls within the watershed and if you qualify for assistance. Even if your farm is not located within these watersheds, please come by and check out all the other programs and services we have to offer.


